

B.S. in Crime and Justice Policy

Criminal Justice is a multidisciplinary field, which draws upon the social and behavioral sciences for much of its content as well as its methodologies. Many graduates of the program move directly into entry-level positions as professionals in the criminal justice system; others choose law school or further study in a range of master's and doctoral degree programs.

In recent years, Sage graduates have accepted positions with the U.S. Marshals Office and the Internal Revenue Service, as well as with state and local law enforcement, judicial, and correctional agencies.

Complete Your Degree

The Bachelor of Science in Crime and Justice Policy enables students who enter with 40 to 90 credits to complete their degree. Chances are you already have completed some college-level work and are prepared to pursue a four-year degree. Most required introductory level courses may have been completed and only need to be transferred in. If that is not the case, a Sage academic advisor will describe convenient alternatives for completing these courses. This innovative program provides working adults with flexible and convenient way to fulfill their college dream.

Sage After Work is:

- **An especially attractive choice for students transferring** from community colleges who need to work while completing their education.
 - **A flexible learning environment.** Sage After Work's continuous schedule and variable class formats reduce classroom time but provide more educational support than online-only programs.

Students are able to create a personal learning plan that fits their individual circumstances.
